



## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What an interesting season we had in 2022.

The year started with the uncertainty as to how the season would pan out due to Covid 19 restrictions. It ended with six teams in finals, five grand finals, three flags and a clubroom vibrating to the sounds of our players and supporters.

As a new President and committee, it was very much a year to assess the impact of the events of the previous two years, what worked, what didn't and how we need to grow. While it was clearly not business as usual and we have a lot we can work on, it is great to see our fundamental philosophy as an inclusive, safe family club has put us in a strong position.

On the field, the club fielded eight teams (3 senior and 5 junior) and had an under ten group training and competing in round robin tournaments. The numbers remained down on pre-covid levels, something that has impacted on the whole competition.

Despite this, the club performed incredibly well. As Simon reported last year we again fielded large contingents of younger players in our senior sides continuing WLC's long tradition of promoting our juniors and developing their talent training and playing with and against the best players in Victoria.

It was great to see our club so well represented in Ireland in the Australian under 21 team. Six players out of a squad of 23 is a 'fantastic' effort and a testament to their hard work and dedication. It is also a testament to the hard work and patience of their parents and coaches. Next year will see some of those players, with other senior players, trying out for the Australian Senior side to compete in San Diego in July 2023.

To Darren Gibson, as Senior Coach and Coordinator thank you for your commitment in particular over the past 3 years. Darren is very much part of the glue that keeps the fabric of the club together. To Damien Orr, thank you for your work as Junior Co-Ordinator and efforts to grow the junior program at a time it has been difficult to get access to the schools.

I'd like to acknowledge the tremendous work of all the Senior and Junior coaches, team managers, scores and umpires. Without your dedication and support we would not be able to field the teams or enjoy the success we have.

To Brooke Rolley, a special thank you for coordinating the kitchen and to all the parents and supporters who helped out, thank you. It felt like an episode of MasterChef each Saturday and made the nights a lot of fun.

To the Committee, thank you. The committee operates on a portfolio basis with each member having a specific responsibility. It is fair to say we might have been a bit rusty at the start of the season, but everyone has put in and contributed to the club's success. Simon Brown in particular, despite his very busy life, has been has been tireless in his effort as Secretary, Matthew Price as treasurer has brought us into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century with the introduction of the 'square' and a cashless club and Michael Kindred not only provided our IT support, website updates, Div. 3 coordinator, captain and League B&F, but cooked some very good hamburgers on a Thursday night. Ben Rotin & Mick Ryley again did a great job managing the Bar.

Thank you also to our Sponsors (including Cliff and the team from Williamstown Health & Lifestyle), and the many others who helped out week to week without whom our success as a club would not happen.

Off the field 2022, we have been successful in obtaining a \$5,000 to help junior players re-engage in team sport. We have engaged in discussion with the Williamstown Women's Lacrosse Club to work more closely in developing the game and are currently jointly conducting clinics at the local primary schools. As Simon reported last year the new lighting and barrier nets have been transformational to the Fearon Reserve lacrosse facilities. This allowed us to host with WWLC the opening round against Footscray under lights. The new mobile Electronic Scoreboard was put into action and overall the night was a great way to get back into a post covid world and a tremendous success.

Thanks to the efforts of Carl Radford and Cardin Flaherty the lights in the Box area were finally repaired by the council. The box is a great facility for young players and it was pleasing to see so many enjoying the facility on Saturday nights. The Council upgrade of the Box Court, is still scheduled to occur in 2023.

This year we have brought the AGM forward to the last week in October rather than the traditional December date. As a committee we felt it important to get an early start on our program for 2023.

We are keen to ramp up our junior program and recruiting overall, work with the joint tenants of the ground to continue to improve facilities. Next year is also the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the club and a huge reason to celebrate the club as both a community and lacrosse institution.

We will be looking to volunteers to organise events to celebrate the year and encourage anyone interested to get involved. We want to continue to grow our great club and encourage anyone who is interested to get involved either on the committee or helping out around the club.

On behalf of the 2022 WLC Committee, once again thank you to all our members and supporters for their support throughout 2022. We look forward to our 125 anniversary in 2023.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

The Financial Statements for the year ending 30 September 2022 should be read in conjunction with the following notes.

The financial statements presented for the 2022 year include the period between 1 November 2021 and 30 September 2022. The committee decided to bring the AGM forward this year and as a result present financials for 11 months. Going forward we will present a financial year of 1 October to 30 September.

As is presented in the financial statements, we ended the year with an operational deficit of \$7,223.48. Given the impact of Covid over the past 2 seasons, a direct comparison with 2021 or 2020 is difficult and as such the last valid comparison is 2019 where we completed a full season.

The deficit was largely driven by;

- · One off Liquor Licence application fees;
- Low Sponsorship levels;
- Reduce Function proceeds;
- Increases in the level of LV Fee subsidisation (due to playing numbers); and
- Offset by an increase in Grant funding

The impact of not having completed a season in two years, and the uncertainty around the ability to hold function or understand capacity constraints made 2022 a difficult year to plan for. We also allowed our Under 21 Australian representatives to run and take all profits from the major function (\$1000 Draw), whilst as a club we did not run any other functions to raise funds.

The club decided to introduce a new Point of Sale (POS) System this year and largely transition to a cashless environment, which has made integrating and understanding the revenue streams far better and has generally been well accepted by the members and guests.

Grant funding for the year was \$6,998.50, of which \$5,000 is still required to be invested in goods or services for the benefit of the younger members of the club. The major cash investment this year was the second instalment of the electronic scoreboard (\$6,364).

Key areas which the 2023 committee should look to address in planning for the season include Bar Prices and Playing Fees and Sponsorship. The strong financial position of the club has meant that we have been able to adapt to the post-covid environment well, going forward we will be in a far better position to plan and budget to ensure we remain in a strong financial position.

#### **Major Projects**

The final instalment for Electronic Scoreboard was paid (\$6,364.60) – no other major project were entered into in 2022.

#### Major variances to 2019

Total income down by \$26.4k, mainly due to;

- Function (\$7.3k)
- Bar sales (\$4.9k)
- Merchandise (\$4.9k)
- Membership Fees Playing & Social (\$8.3k)
- Sponsorship (\$9.9k)
- Offset by Grants (+ve \$7k)

The \$26.4k of reduced revenue only materialised in a \$10.8k net cash turn around (as compared to 2019) due to some reduced expenditure, expenditure was \$15.6k lower driven mainly by;

- Reduced "Lacrosse" spend (\$10.8k)
- Reduction in LV Playing Fees (\$4.4k)
- Merchandise for Sale (\$3.8k)
- Prior Period Recoveries (\$4.1k)
- Offset by Electronic Scoreboard +\$6.3k

One off Liquor Licence pmts – +\$1.8k

#### **Key Points**

There are a few other items driving the result which are worth mentioning

- 1. Merchandise stocks were very low to commence 2022, as a result we purchased a number of hoodies and other items throughout the season. Costs exceed sales by ~\$2.8k but there is stock on hand going into 2023 thanks to Vanessa Wilkinson for taking on the role of managing the merchandise
- 2. Bar Margins as a percentage of Sales have reduced slightly from 2019
- 3. Within the accounts there are two items which have been represented as "Prior Period Recoveries" from 2021. The reimbursement of The WWLC portion of the Gas, Electricity and Bin Hire bills and the sale of Bar Stock to WICC were not in the 2021 accounts, to ensure comparability going forward these amounts have been separated in the Income and Expenditure Statements.
- 4. All items included in Accounts Receivable or Accounts Payable have been accounted for prior to the AGM

Overall, 2022 served as a bit of a reset for the club, however we have a much better idea of what the club revenue and cost base will look like in 2023 which will allow for more confident planning going forward.

#### **Special Mention**

There are a few people who I owe big thanks for their support this year. Firstly, to Michael Kindred, who was a great support in transitioning to the new PoS system and in general with making things happen on the committee.

Brooke and the team that worked in the kitchen this year, your contribution is always valued and some of the Saturday night food this year was pretty awesome – it was great to see so many new faces serving the food on a Saturday.

To all the loyal Social Club members, and our Sponsors, in particular Duncan Russell (International Mowers) and David Robinson (Garden Street Gin Club) for their ongoing financial support.

To Vanessa Wilkinson for stepping in and taking on the Merchandise role this year, thank you very much and we look forward to being ready to go with some exciting new merchandise in 2023.

Finally, to Darren Henderson and Chris Welsh for organising refs this season, and especially to those who were entitled to be paid for their time but essentially donated the money back. Overall of the \$3,120 that was owed to club members, \$1,740 was donated back to the club, with a special mention to Jake Rooney who volunteered nearly every week and donated back \$650 – an amazing contribution to the club for 2022 and many seasons prior.

#### <u>Audit</u>

The 2022 Financial Accounts for the Williamstown Lacrosse Club Inc have been audited by Mr C Taylor. My thanks to Colin for time and input into the reporting of the accounts. The club is lucky to have an auditor who understands the way the club works and challenges to ensure the financials are reported accurately year-on-year.

In summary, the financial result of the club while negative in terms of the cash in the bank, is positive in the sense that our strong financial position has allowed us to come through a very challenging period with a strong balance sheet and the ability to plan and reset to continue as a strong club well into the future. As mentioned in previous Treasurers reports, the club exists for its members and not to make profits, however having a robust asset base provides the club the ability to plan and invest in the future as well as weather unpredictable and unforeseen circumstances. The ongoing challenge of the Committee is to make sure it leverages the financial position to continue to strengthen our club, and sport, both on and off field.

#### **Division 3**

2022 was an interesting year for our Division 3 team.

Michael Kindred took on the coaching/co-ordination role again in 2022. Initially we were considering not even running a 3rds team due to low player numbers across Division 3 & Division 1. However, we persisted and managed to pull together a team with a total of 39 different players playing throughout the year.

The year was frustrating for all involved, with our team playing fewer games than every other club in the competition due to the lack of Division 3 numbers from other clubs, which meant we were often given walkovers. We took the field a mere 7 times out of a possible 15 home and away games, and as Altona pulled out of the competition halfway through, it saw our final series restructured to the top team going directly into the grand final with 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> playing off to participate in the grand final.
